

Wednesday Lenten Worship: Praying Like Jesus

The gospel of Luke tells us that the disciples came to Jesus and asked, "Lord, teach us to pray, as John taught his disci-

ples." Luke 11:1 In that question, it seems clear that the disciples had noticed something about how Jesus prayed. Perhaps they saw a closeness to God evident in his prayers. Perhaps they noticed how genuine Jesus was in prayer. Perhaps they recognized how renewed and fulfilled Jesus was in prayer and they wanted that from their own prayers. In answering them, Jesus taught them the Lord's prayer.

The yearning for meaningful prayer that the disciples felt is something that we yearn for as well. This year's Wednesday Lenten worship services center around the theme of 'Praying Like Jesus.' As we journey to the cross and the empty tomb this year, we will consider



how Jesus prayed and how we can share in praying like him. Lenten worship will be each Wednesday in March at 7:00pm. We will worship using the Vespers service that we are familiar with from the LBW (green book).

The Lenten offerings received this year will go to Cupid's Chase, a local organization that offers support and aid to families that have children with disabilities. Please give generously.

Celebrate Easter with an Easter Lily

Easter lilies trumpet our joy at the resurrection of Christ. Place an Easter Lily in the sanctuary for our Easter worship and then enjoy it at home. Lilies are \$15.00 per plant and the deadline is March 24. Forms are available in the narthex.

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The movie was made about 30 years before any of my confirmation students were born, but still I show it every time as we talk about the death and resurrection of Jesus. The movie was made in 1986, and was entitled

The Mission starring Jeremy Irons, Robert DeNiro, and a very young Liam Neeson. The story is captivating.

Set in the early 1700's in South America, the story begins with a Roman Catholic priest, Father Gabriel, making contact with a local indigenous tribe and trying to convert them to Christianity.



Hundreds of feet tall, and not only does Mendoza have to get himself up, but he must do so dragging the bag representing his past. On and on the ordeal goes.

Eventually, the priests make it to the waiting tribe, and as they are greeting each other, a muddy, filthy, exhausted Mendoza arrives, still dragging his bag. He falls to his

knees.

Meanwhile a mercenary, Mendoza, has been preying on this very tribe, capturing people and killing them or selling them as slaves, returns to the



established city, only to find the woman he loves in the arms of another man. It was his brother, and they engaged in a duel, and Mendoza in his rage ends up killing his brother.

When Father Gabriel himself returns, he finds Mendoza refusing all human contact, and even turning away from God. Father Gabriel offers him a penance to try to find forgiveness. "Do you dare try it?" Father Gabriel asks. Mendoza challenges back, "Do you dare to see it fail?"

The next scene shows Father Gabriel and other priests making their way through dense jungle, oppressive heat, and muddy mountains, on their way back to the tribe for more mission work. Following along behind them is Mendoza, but he is dragging a bag full of the relics of his mercenary life: swords, armor, and weapons. As he makes his way, the bag catches on, rocks, roots, and trees, he struggles painfully to drag it behind him up muddy, slippery mountain paths. Eventually, one of the priests cuts it away from him, and Mendoza climbs back down the mountain and ties it back on.

Amazingly, after this incredible struggle, it gets harder. They reach the waterfalls which must be climbed. The tribespeople recognize their enemy, and one picks up a knife and runs to Mendoza, lifts his head and holds the knife at his throat. The chief of the tribe speaks to Father Gabriel who answers, and then the chief utters his instructions. The man with the knife cuts away the bag and rolls it off the cliff and into the river. Mendoza breaks down laughing and crying all at once. The forgiveness he has received from his enemies allows him to understand and receive the forgiveness of God. His past wrong has been cut away and it is gone forever.

It's a powerful scene and opens the door for the class and me to talk about the weight of our sins that we carry, the baggage of our past, and how Christ's death



cuts that away and frees us to be new people.

As we make our Lenten journey, we

journey with Jesus to the cross. There, the bags of our guilt and sin, the baggage we carry of misspent pasts and wrongful ways is cut away, not by our enemy, but in the wondrous love of God.

Lent is a time when we think about all these things. "Create in us clean hearts, O God," we plead, the words of the Psalmist becoming our heart's cry. We fall, burdened, at the foot of the cross.

We rise to new life.

Ask Miss Edith:

Dear Miss Edith,

Recently I found myself in a very awkward position, and I'd like your thoughts. I definitely feel like I could have handled the situation better.



I entered our sanctuary a few minutes before the service was to begin and was thrilled that our organist had chosen a Bach piece for the prelude. I am quite fond of Bach's music and find it so inspiring. She was doing a masterful job and had just started the second

section when a friend of mine sat down beside me. I hadn't seen this friend in several months. She first whispered, "good morning". But then she proceeded to fill me in on the events of her life for the past several months we'd been apart. I desperately wanted to hear her news, and I even had things I wanted to talk to her about. But Bach was being played. I tried politely to send non-verbal cues that I didn't want to talk, but, bless her, my friend didn't pick up on the cues, so I sat there trying to hear my beloved Bach and listen to my cherished friend. I wound up feeling cheated of both a meaningful conversation and a delightful Bach prelude. What could I have done? Bach-less in Boston

Dear Bach-less,

First, consider yours a blessing of abundance! To be a part of a congregation that supports great music is indeed a wonderful gift. To be part of a congregation where people love being together and thrill in sharing their lives with others is beyond rewarding. It is a small piece of heaven on earth. You, dear reader, are blessed to be part of a congregation with both great music and wonderful fellowship—truly a blessing of abundance.

But Miss Edith does understand your dilemma. Miss Edith is aware that often there is friendly chattering in the congregation while she is playing the prelude—prelude music that she's spent hours carefully preparing. Miss Edith is not offended and does not take such muted conversations as an insult to her skill or time. However, *muted conversation* is not a term Miss Edith uses unintentionally nor lightly. In Miss Edith's humble opinion conversation once the prelude has begun should be quiet and brief. Further, Miss Edith is of the opinion that the service of worship starts with the first note of the prelude. If someone is engaging you in conversation perhaps you could look at them briefly, smile warmly, then deliberately look at the organist. If the friend wishes to continue the conversation, perhaps a warm, friendly, but firm "let's talk after worship", might enlighten the speaker to your situation.

However, if someone is being loud and boisterous, Miss Edith is not above issuing a firm, but loving glare of disapproval.

In all cases, however, Miss Edith understands that the congregation is about the Spirit of God being poured out, love being expressed, acceptance being proclaimed, and Christ mercy shared for all. This is far greater than anything Bach ever wrote. Miss Edith feels confident that that is something with which the great J.S. Bach, himself, would agree.



Council Approves Instant Church Directory App

When our last Pictorial Directory was completed in 2020, it was in the middle of the pandemic, and in fact, we were the last congrega-

tion to have a directory printed as the company shut down operations for church directories. In its February meeting, the Church Council approved a new way to create a directory for our congregation. Using instant Church Directory, individuals will be able to upload a picture, update their information like addresses and phone numbers, and then be able to access a directory for our church on their phone or computer. There are a lot more positive features, and there will also be assistance offered to help you get started. Watch for more information.

In Unfinished Business, Pastor Gary informed the Council that the HVAC unit for use in the Preschool wing has finally arrived and we should soon be contacted by the installer to get this completed. It's taken about six months for this to work through the supply chain issues.

Council also approved Mike Parker securing an updated bid for treating the grass at the edge of our parking lot to prevent it growing over the asphalt.

The Council is also beginning to look into the future and thinking about where we want to be and what our ministry might look like in 5+ years. Rev. James Hendrick from the SC Synod will meet in a special session on February 24 to envision possibilities for our future together. As the Council moved to new business, the first item was to begin looking for voting members for the SC Synod Assembly in June. Two were quickly found and one other is checking their availability.

In addition to the Instant Church Directory, the Council is exploring updating our Church Management Software to make use of new and more streamlined processes.

Finally, the Council has heard concerns about the need for updating and refreshing the landscaping in the front of the church. Jane Long, who is a Master Gardener, has offered to help us draw up some plans for beautifying this area.

The meeting closed with prayer by Pastor Amanda and the members of the Council shared the Peace.
