

Congregational Meeting to Consider New Electronic Sign Set for July 23

We have talked about it for a long time. A few years ago, the need for a new roof took precedence, and then last year, the priority became the parking lot. At long last, the Council is ready to bring a proposal for a new electronic sign to the congregation for consideration in a Congregational meeting following worship on July 23.


In 2015, we had a mold issue behind the front wall of the sanctuary, and as we looked at that repair, we asked, "Why not put back what we would like instead of just replacing what was there?" We are in a similar situation with the sign. As our current sign has aged, we have reached a point where repairs are needed, especially to the top, and so the time has come to do something, and a new electronic sign will be a new face to our community and allow us to reach out into our community with information about our congregation.

The current message board on our sign has served us well, but it is also very limiting. Not only can the messages be difficult to read at 40mph as you go down St. Andrews Rd., but it can also make us appear to be stuck in the past. Changing the sign is a significant undertaking, allowing us only one message a week. An electron-

ic message board can offer us much more flexibility and a variety of ways to communicate with our community. The message board will offer attractive messages, and dims during the hours of darkness so it isn't too bright for drivers or our neighbors in the apartments.

The cost of the sign is approximately \$48,000 including the removal of our old
sign. There are some additional expenses to get electricity to the area as well.
The Council is proposing that we pay for the sign by combining two funding are-
as. First, you may remember that when we undertook the parking lot, we bor-
rowed from our cash reserves to pay for it, promising to pay ourselves back and
replace that money. We have done that, and have also accrued about \$26,000
in a property contingency fund by continuing to set aside our regular mortgage
payment, even though the mortgage was paid off last year. For the second half
of the money, Council is proposing using the remainder of the Edna Corley be-
quest. This bequest was made to our congregation about 20 years ago, and the
unrestricted money has been used up for a while. Continued on page 4.

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What is it about Redeemer?

Not too long ago, I was visiting with someone relatively new to our family of faith who commented to me that even though she

had been part of numerous churches throughout her life, she had never experienced the sense of love in a church that she found at Redeemer.

Then, just last week, someone told me that in their experience, liturgical churches typically exuded an air of "what can you do for the church," but that's not what they found here at Redeemer. Here, they said, they found a family of faith that was concerned for and about each other, and about being present in our community and making a difference.

What is it about Redeemer?

The pandemic has eased enough that we were able to have a reception following Susan Lorick's funeral, and whenever one of those after-funeral receptions happens, I hear from our church members over and over again how their friends who are not part of our congregation comment repeatedly on the reception and the incredible outpouring of love that represents.

On a recent Sunday during the announcements, Pastor

Amanda was talking about the need for some funds to pay for providing a book for each of the students at Seven Oaks Elementary to have their own book over the summer. This project is an outgrowth of the S.A.V.E. initiative we have begun (S.A.V.E. stands for St. Andrews Visioning Event where



we provide a forum for as many churches in our community to come together to look at the needs of our community, how we are meeting those needs, how we can cooperate, explore what we are missing, and how we can make a difference in our community). At the last meeting, we perceived that if a child is given a book as their own, they are likely to take pride in it and be encouraged to read it. Reading is a step to improved education and better life outcomes. So if we want to make a difference in our community, this is a small step — a place to start. As Pastor Amanda was



making that announcement, I was standing in the back beside Emily Hartmann (Assistant to the Bishop) who said to me, "We'd like to tell this story at the Synod Assembly." If that works out, it would mark two years in a row. Last year, they told the story of the children carrying the wooden processional cross. In being who we are, Redeemer is

setting an example for other congregations.

What is it about Redeemer?

Pastor Amanda and I never tire of trying to tell you what a special place and family of faith this is. I think in several ways, it's hard for you to realize this. You don't regularly hear from other congregations across the synod. We aren't in the habit of comparing our church to other congregations, and indeed, other congregations have special things going on too.

But that's one of those things about Redeemer: we are simply going about being who we are as God's people. It's not done with pride or pretense or for a show: it's simply whom God has called us to be. It's simply us responding to God's call. It's faith lived out among us.

The joy and love found here is truly special. At times we may disagree about an issue, but the disagreement doesn't divide us. This is a place of care, compassion, and understanding. This is a place where the joy of God's love is lived out and shared. This is a place where all are welcome in, and we are about welcoming out into our community. We are striving to make a difference in people's lives for good, because of God. Maybe that's what it is about Redeemer.

The full Mission Statement of our congregation is "Redeemer Lutheran Church is an open congregation of believers in Jesus Christ. Our mission is to witness to the Gospel of God's grace and to respond to human needs in love and understanding as Christ's disciples in the Church, the community, and the world.' Our slogan is "Making Christ Known in Word and Deed."

That's who we are. That's what we do. Maybe that's what it is about Redeemer.

However, there are funds remaining there (about \$25,000) that are designated for certain areas of ministry. Frankly, in the years since, and especially since the pandemic, our church ministries have changed and

it is unlikely that the ministries that the money was intended for are viable or needed any more. The world has changed and so have the needs of the church. The Council believes that Ms. Corley would prefer her money to be used rather than to languish in a bank account.

Pastor Gary consulted with Mickey Epting, the lawyer Ms. Corley used to set up the bequest, and he has advised that we are free to change these designations and use this money for the sign. The Council believes combining the Property Contingency money and the Corley money will cover the cost of the sign.



What will the sign look like? Design plans are currently underway. The Council has established a committee to consider the 'branding' of our congregation to put on the sign. Perhaps one example of a similar sign to what we expect might be the sign in front of Dutch Fork Church on Highway 6 near the fork in Ballentine. The colors would match and blend with our building. As the design becomes more developed, the Council will keep you well informed.

Once our order is placed, there is a lag time of about 5-6 months before work on the sign is completed and it can be installed.

Plan to join us for this important meeting on July 23.

We continue to slowly roll out the Instant Church Directory. If you have not had the chance to sign up yet here are the steps you can take... (don't worry, tech support is always willing to help!)



- Send your name and the email address you wish to use with the church to <u>aburke@relu.church</u>
 - Pastor Amanda will input your information (give her a day or so.)
- If you're using your smart phone to access the directory go to your app store and download Instant Church Directory. It will have an icon with a white church silhouette and green background.
- When you open the app, you will use your email address and create a login password.
- An email will be sent to you for verification of your email. Click on the link provided.
- Login to Instant Church Directory. Feel free to explore the different pages and information.
- To add your household's specific information go to the "families" tab. You will have the option to "edit my family." From there you should be able to add household members and their information. You can also upload a photograph of your family.
- The information will be approved by an administrator before it goes live on the app.If you need assistance please reach out to Pastor Amanda or someone that is already signed up for assistance.



First let me share with you a very personal and life-changing story.

I was a "know-it-all" high school freshman at Gilbert High School. I knew without a doubt that I loved being in our high



school band. I was assigned the French horn and was in love with its sound and the musical challenge it presented.

I also figured I didn't want to be or need to be in chorus.

Sometimes the adults in our lives have to do things to help us see the error in our ways—that's a nice way of saying they need to help us see how stu-

pid we sometimes act. Such was my case.

That semester I was assigned to study hall. (For another article—Why study halls should never be a thing.) My study hall period was the same time the high school chorus met.

Mrs. Margaret Eargle, our high school choir teacher, realized the foolishness of my decision so she did something that changed my life. She requested my study hall teacher to send me to the choir room to deliver a message to her.

As I walked down the long hallway to the choir room, I could clearly hear the choir singing. To this day I remember what they were singing, but I'll save that for later.

I remember leaning against the walls listening to the choir sing. It was sublime. I was mesmerized by that choral sound. And in that moment I fell in love. I can't begin to describe how I felt—just that I was in love.

Once the group finished their song, I walked in and handed Mrs. Eargle the note. For some reason it didn't seem odd that she didn't even look at it. She placed it on the piano and looked up at me.

"Would you like to stay a little longer," she asked knowing the answer.

"Sure!" I quickly responded.

"Great, here's the music we're doing next. Why don't you sit with the tenors."

I don't know what heaven's like; but that rehearsal was probably as close as I'll get on this side of life.



After the rehearsal ended, I went to Mrs. Eargle. Handing her the music I said simply, "I think I've made a big mistake."

"I know," she said, not condescendingly, but lovingly.

"Let's go talk to the guidance counselor. We can change your schedule."

That little incident changed my life forever. It is the reason I am where I am today. It is the reason I am still to this day in love with choral music and have devoted my life to this wonderful art form.

Never underestimate the power of a teacher.

The piece the choir was singing was "How Lovely is Thy Dwelling Place" from Brahms exquisite *Ein Deutsches Requiem*.

3. If you are interested in funding the repair or the fix contact one of the pastors or the individual and work out a solution.


When a task is completed be sure to let Pastor Amanda know so that we can keep our list updated! Thanks folks!

Redeemer's Sunday morning communication cards invite everyone to write a question they have about faith or about God. Everyone is welcome to submit questions. Each month, I'll try to answer one of them in my newsletter article. This

month's question ...

Why is it so easy for God to forgive, and I can't?

Let's be really honest with ourselves. Forgiveness is hard.

We could look at this from the lens of science. Over time, humanity developed the need to remember negative events more clearly for survival. Our brains are wired to be able to recall negative situations more easily than positive situations. In many instances, the act of forgiveness asks us to put aside those negative memories. At times our society has also pushed the idea of "forgive and forget." Not only does that go against the wiring of our brains, it can also be a way to dismiss the hurt we cause each other.

This is one of those times that I am thankful that God is God, and I am not. In the book of Romans, we hear Paul telling the people, "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation will be able to sepa-



rate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." It is a powerful statement. Nothing, absolutely nothing, will separate us from the love of God. God is bigger than anything we could ever do to warrant forgiveness. God's goodness overshadows and overcomes anything else.

While I'm not sure if it is "easy" for God to forgive, I know that God does. God's love for each and every person is beyond measure. There is nothing we can do for God to love us any more, and there is certainly nothing we can do for God to love us any less. God's love is just that big.

When it comes to forgiveness among each other, that is a constant work in progress. People are capable of doing some really horrible things to one another. Working through the process of forgiveness can be a long and difficult journey. In many cases, it becomes a matter of releasing ourselves from the negativity we hold against someone else. No matter where you are on that path, I hope you can lean into the love God has for you and the community of faith that surrounds you.

Council Proposes New Sign; Calls Congregational Meeting for July 23

The Church Council has called a congregational meeting on July 23 to consider a proposal for a new electronic sign to replace our old sign on St. Andrews Rd. The cost of the sign is approximately \$48,000 plus some installation costs, and the proposal includes the source of funds (the property contingency fund with moneys collected after the parking lot expense, and the remainder of the Edna Corley bequest to our congregation). The Council established a sub committee to work on the details of the sign design.

In addition to this topic, the Council also learned that the HVAC unit for over the preschool wing should be installed in the next few weeks.

Council also decided to remove the signs indicating the current Covid level. The government is no longer reporting the Covid Level as often, so this is not a useful tool for our congregation at this time. Council advises the congregation that Covid is still out there and anyone who doesn't feel well is encouraged to view the worship from home. Masks and hand sanitizer will remain available in our narthex for those who desire to use them.

Pastor Gary reported that we are eligible to do another phase of our lighting conversion to energy efficient LED fluorescent lights. This program is offered through Dominion Energy and covers 85-90% of the costs up to \$6000 to convert these lights, and we have been doing it in phases each year to take advantage of this. The costs we incur are also recouped over the years through energy savings. We have completed four phases, and have two remaining. Council has pinpointed our Fellowship Center for this next phase, leaving only some very seldom used classrooms for our final phase next year.

Pastor Gary also highlighted two sets of restrooms where the exhaust fan isn't working, and Council will have an electrician look into this.

Council also approved exploring replacing computers in the church office.

A couple of youth representatives attended the Council meeting to share about their activities and how our congregation could offer greater support to our youth ministry program.
