

## **Council Creates Property Assessment Team**

Many of us know the aches and pains of growing older, and our building and grounds are experiencing the same thing. As our building ages, repairs are sometimes needed and wear and tear begins to show. Lately, our church staff — mostly the pastors — have been called on to oversee any



repairs that needed happening and these efforts are requiring time they could better spend in ministry. To help with this matter, the Council has created the Property Assessment Team.

Led by Steve Summer, this team will act with responsibilities like what a Property Committee would do. In recent years, Redeemer's property concerns were largely ad-

dressed by Tim Campbell or Greg Cross as individuals, but now this team will first begin to assess our property and what needs immediate attention. Then, they will oversee getting the work done. A second focus will be to begin looking at longer term needs like schedules of replacement for things, or drawings of how different systems in the church operate.

God has entrusted this facility to us, and our care for our property reflects on our response to God's blessings. We need five or six people to help with this Assessment Team. If you are willing to help, please contact Steve Summer, Bill Newmyer, or Pastor Gary.

"I was there to hear your borning cry, I'll be there when you are old. I rejoiced the day you were baptized to see your life unfold.

My phone dinged, and I stared at the message, absorbing it, hardly knowing what to do or how to respond. The text was from a friend telling me that his father had died. I remembered Edd so fondly. Nan and I were a young couple, just starting out and finding our way in ministry. Edd and his wife were the age of our parents, but they 'adopted' us, constantly friendly, often inviting us over to share a meal in their home, bringing us produce from their garden, always supportive and present at church. His wife died several years ago, but Edd, was still going strong, into his 90's. We kept in touch: Edd, his family, and ours.

When I received the text, Nan and I were excited because we were just days away from a trip to Texas to see our granddaughter, Hannah, baptized. That likely meant that we wouldn't be in town to attend Edd's funeral.

"In the middle ages of your life, not too old, no longer young, I'll be there to guide you through the night,



complete what I've begun. When the evening gently closes in and you shut your weary eyes, I'll be there as I have always been, with just one more surprise."

It was an interesting juxtaposition: death and new life together, just days apart. As I reflected on the two



events coming so closely together, I began to think about our funeral pall. The pall is a large white cloth that we use over the casket at a funeral. We have an urn pall as well, and palls to fit youth and child sized caskets if needed. But the thing is: while a pall is used at a funeral, it is actually a baptismal garment. The message of the pall is that as this

person was wrapped in the righteousness of Christ at their baptism, this garment is a visible sign that the person is still wrapped in the righteousness of Christ, even in death. With the pall used at every funeral, it says that we are alike in our need for God's grace, and we are alike in receiving it too. Our earthly distinctions don't matter. God was there to hear our borning cry, and God is there when evening closes in with the surprise of new life.

I sat there in the middle of the two: the new birth in Christ of baptism, and the victorious death on the far end of a long and well-lived life. And in one of those moments when God gave me just the right words to say, I responded to my friend that we would "be In Texas for our granddaughter's baptism as she begins the journey that Edd has now completed. "

We are all on that journey. God has blessed us, God will receive us, and God is with us all the way through. Thanks be to God for the surprise of grace.



"That first breath that a choir or orchestra takes together, a breath filled with focus, intention and emotion, a breath unified for no other reason than to make something beautiful together... that is the reason we do what we do."

--Eric Whitacre

I started our Fall Choir Workshop with that quote from the American composer, Eric Whitacre.

The choir pondered that quotation for a while as we collectively recognized what it was saying—as a choir we know that moment, we've lived it, and we all sort of live for it—that communal breath.

We focus on breathing a lot in choir practice. Well, you have to breathe to sing; and, of course, you have to breathe to live!

But there's something about a unified communal breath—a fullbodied inhalation—that by it's very nature unites us. Ask anyone who's taken a Yoga class. Breathing is so much more than taking in sufficient gases to sustain life.

Just like a finely prepared and presented meal is so much more than nutrients to feed our physical bodies.

That communal choral breath before singing is a powerful moment full of anticipation, excitement, and togetherness.

Even as listeners, you can feel that anticipation and excitement.

The choir takes that breath together for the purpose of making beautiful sounds.

It's a moment that has no parallel; at least, not in my world.

But suppose we do press a bit on Mr. Whitacre's observation.



What would it mean if the Church breathes God's spirit for no other reason than to make something beautiful together. And, like music, that response varies from song to song, from situation to situation.

That communal breath of God might be to worship with honesty and humility; to experience God together in community.

But maybe that divine breath might mean a commitment to

understanding others, listening to others, serving others, letting go of those ways of thinking and living that hinder our relationships with others...and even our relationship with God.

May we breathe together for the sole purpose of loving God and God's creation.





That's right, I owe you the titles of some more of my most beloved pieces of choral music. Instead of overloading you with a bunch of songs, I'm going to give you one a month. That seems more practical to

So this month's selection, appropriately enough, is written by Eric Whitacre.

me.

Whitacre described his own experience with his first choral rehearsal as a turning point in his life, saying, "In my entire life I had seen in black and white, and suddenly everything was in shocking Technicolor. It was the most transformative experience I've ever had—in that single moment, hearing dissonance and harmony, and people singing..."

*Lux Aurumque* ("Light and Gold", sometimes "Light of Gold") is a Christmas

piece based on a Latin poem of the same name, which translates as "Light, warm and heavy as pure gold, and the angels sing softly to the newborn baby".

Here's a link to the piece. In this link, you can see the actual music as the choir sings. Two significant things you'll notice:

1. All parts are subdivided—Soprano 1 and soprano 2; alto 1 and alto 2, and so on. This gives this work such depth and sonorous richness. It's the choral equivalent of some decadently rich chocolate dessert.

2. It's unaccompanied. There are dissonances that would be jarring as instrumental music, but when sung it's absolutely the sound of heaven. Such breath-taking sounds!! Indeed, the sound of angels.

## Did You Know? Burmese Christians Meet at Redeemer

The Redeemer Family has hosted multiple groups in their building and on their campus over the years. Relationships with different organizations have come and gone. Right now we have a growing relationship with a developing Bur-

mese Church. Years ago Chosen Chin was affiliated with Redeemer through work with a sponsored refugee family. In the past 2 years he has been involved with Redeemer again. Two of his daughters are very active in our youth ministry. Siang is in 11<sup>th</sup> grade and participates with the High School Youth. Gladdy is in 8<sup>th</sup> grade and is always at Middle School Youth Group. You'll also see her at worship regularly and helping in the Sunday morning nursery.

Chosen has been working hard to bring the different groups of Burmese refugees and pastors together for joint worship, Bible study, and fellowship. On Sunday afternoons and Friday evenings if you wonder why our parking lot is fairly full... it is this beautiful gathering of the



various Burnese groups. And if you happen to be in the building you'll hear the laughter and joy of many children, a sermon given and scripture read in the Chin language, and faith lifted up in vibrant song.

It is a wonderful relationship. This group needs a place to gather, worship, and study. Redeemer has ample space and availability. We've already had ministry crossover with Chosen's children being active in our youth ministry. It will be beautiful to see where else this relationship might lead. Please keep our Burmese friends and neighbors in your prayers!

# Council Approves Sign Design; Initiates Property Assessment Team

The new sign is getting closer and closer. In October, the Council approved the design for our sign created by our 'sign design' team along with representatives of the sign company. We will soon be signing contracts and really getting things underway (although the process will take several months).

Council also considered the issue of managing our property. Our church staff is often called upon to manage contacting vendors and managing repairs that need completion for the building — often taking time they should be involved with other ministries they are better suited for. Steve Summer will chair a property assessment team — a group of about six or so who will first meet to begin determining needs our facility and grounds have and devising ways to deal with them. This may also begin to look at preventative maintenance, and developing drawings that would help in time of needed repairs.

Council also heard from Kare Burke as a representative of our youth, learning about many youth activities over the summer and the impact those events had in their lives. Council also asked about how our congregation can better support and encourage our youth ministry.

In other reports, Pastor Gary announced that the next phase of the lighting project with Dominion Energy will happen on October 2. This project covers the conversion of our fluorescent lighting to LED lighting which eventually pays for itself with electricity cost savings. Dominion pays up to \$6000 for each phase we do. This is our fourth (of five) phases and will focus on the Fellowship Center. Redeemer's cost for this phase will be about \$2000.

The time to replace the Church computers has come, and Redeemer's Tech Team will assist the office with getting what is needed.

It was discovered that we do have financial policies and procedures, so the outside financial review was tabled until the opportunity to look through the procedures we already have can happen.

The Annual Congregational Meeting is scheduled for November 19, following worship.
