Why Is there No Mid-Day Quiet Communion?

There are some significant days in the Church Year that feature worship occurs during the evening and feature Holy Communion. However, there are some who have difficulty getting out on the roads at night or who have other family obligations at the time of the worship. So, Mid-Day Quiet Communion is a simple worship (with no music – that's why it's called "Quiet"). However, this year, with Christmas Eve on a Sunday, there is a morning service with communion, so communion will be available at that time.

What Happens When Christmas Eve Is on a Sunday?

This year presents a unique problem with Christmas Eve occurring on a Sunday. Technically, it's the Fourth Sunday in Advent that morning and Christmas Eve that evening.

Redeemer will observe both with a meditative service of prayer with communion in the morning. This service will feature changing the Advent paraments to the Christmas paraments as part of worship, and the church will already be decorated for Christmas Eve.

Then join us for Christmas Eve that evening at 7:00pm with Candlelight and Communion.

Once there was a young boy who was bitterly disappointed at not being cast as Joseph in the church Christmas pageant. Instead, he was given the relatively minor role of the innkeeper. Throughout the weeks of re-

hearsal, he tried to think of how he might avenge himself on the boy who was Joseph. On the night of the performance, Joseph and Mary made their entrance and knocked on the door of the inn. The innkeeper cracked the door and eyed them coldly. "Can you give us board and lodging for the night?" pleaded Joseph, who then stepped back awaiting the expected rebuff. But the innkeeper had not pondered all those weeks for nothing. Flinging the door wide, he beamed and bright smile and cried, "Come in, Come in! You shall have the best room in the hotel!" There was a pause, and then with great presence of mind, the youthful Joseph said to Mary, "Hold on. I'll take a look inside first." He peered past the innkeeper, shook his head firmly and announced, "I'm not taking my wife into a place like that. Come on, Mary, we'll sleep in the stable." And the plot was back on course.

That joke makes us laugh, and oh, how full of laughter and joy Mary must have been to be part of God's plot

— to know that the course of God's plan would run through her. Oh, how full of laughter and joy she must have been to know that she was the handmaid of God. This child...this child would be God's own Son! God made flesh; God one of us. In her was growing the fulfillment of all hopes and dreams for all



peoples. In her was growing the longed for, long awaited Messiah of God. In her, of all women, God was doing what God had promised. I'm sure she thought back to Sarah, Abraham's wife, and how when God told Abraham that Sarah would have a child in her extreme old age, and that a multitude would descend from them — how Sarah laughed — laughed at the unbelievableness of it — laughed because she did believe laughed at what God was doing in her. And I'm sure



Mary felt just the same. There were plenty of things to be serious about or afraid about or to wonder about as well. What does it all mean? How could all this happen? And most of all, why her? But when it came right down to it, she had to laugh. God's plot was underway in her. What more can the heart that is touched by God do but dance? What more could she

feel but joy?

One more story: this one about a little girl who was helping her mother wrap Christmas presents and who asked her mother why Jesus didn't get presents if it was his birthday. The mother explained that exchanging gifts was the way people showed love for each other because God so loves us. Then the matter was dropped. On Christmas Eve, the little girl brought a little box all wrapped up in pretty paper and put it under the tree. "What's in the box?" her mother asked. "A gift for Jesus," the girl replied. "He can open it tonight while I'm asleep." The mother didn't want her daughter disappointed, so later that night she opened the box. There was nothing in it. The next morning, the girl ran out to the tree. "Mama!" she shouted, "Jesus opened his present last night!" The mystified mother asked, "What did you give him?" And the little girl explained, "I figure Jesus has everything he needs, and I can't give him much because I'm just a little girl. But there is one thing I can give him. So I gave him a box of love."

You know, that's just what Jesus wants from us too. In that young woman, Mary, God is giving us an incredible gift. It's something so new, so miraculous, so saving, so unexpected, so full of grace, that all we can do is laugh. In that young woman, Mary, there is a gift that fulfills all our hopes and dreams, a gift that makes us new, a gift of overwhelming love. God is with us, and his name is Jesus. What more can we do but be filled with joy? What more can we do than to give our love back? What more can we do than laugh at the wonder of it all?

Ponder. Laugh. Be filled with joy. In this child, God gives us love.

I'll be the first to admit that singing unfamiliar music is quite a challenge. It's a challenge for everyone, even those who are musicians and can read music.



Part of the problem is that if you're struggling with a new (and sometimes awkward) melody, you can't even think about the words.

In fact, sometimes in choir practice we'll just sing the notes on a "la" or "doo" or some other "neutral syllable." That way we can focus on one thing at a time.

So for a few minutes, I'd like us to do the opposite: focus on the words of

two new and thought-provoking Advent hymns. One appears in ELW; the other in our new supplement "All Creation Sings."

Take a few minutes to read and contemplate these somewhat mystic texts.

"Each Winter As the Year Grows Older"

Text by William Gay

ELW 252



Each winter as the year grows older, we each grow older, too. The chill sets in a little colder; the verities we knew seem shaken and untrue.

Maybe you see yourself in this; maybe you don't. But for those of us who struggle with faith and being faithful, this text rings uncomfortably true. As we look around at a very beak and broken world the light of Christ seems dim, indeed. We question those "truths" that we've been taught. Doubt grows and lingers.

When race and class cry out for treason, when sirens call for war, They over-shout the voice of reason and scream till we ignore all we held dear before.

As 2023 comes to an end we witness the brutality of war, the destruction of violence, the devastation of hatred. With on-going wars in Ukraine and the Middle East and other places around the world, this text rings uncomfortably true. It seems the voices of hatred and violence are the only voices we hear.

Yet I believe beyond believing that life can spring from death, That growth can flower from our grieving, that we can catch our breath and turn transfixed by faith.

In this season of Advent—that season of waiting and preparing—we can slow down and spiritually catch our breaths; to remember that we don't have to have it all figured out; that doubt is just the other side of faith; that God's Spirt still comforts the brokenhearted and heals the struggling soul.

So even as the sun is turning to journey to the north, The living flame in secret burning, can kindle on the earth and bring God's love to birth.

The sun journeys again from its winter solstice apogee, hanging in its southern-most horizon to follow its northern trek bringing a new Spring and a new zenith in its vernal apex. Even in the lowest position of the sun is the promise that it will journey to the north and bring warmth and brightness. Likewise, God's Spirit dwelling in the secret places of our hearts will transform us, shine on us, and enable us to love and to be loved.

O Child of ecstasy and sorrows, O Prince of peace and pain, Brighten today's world by tomorrow's, renew our lives again; Lord Jesus, come and reign!



The other song is less transcendental; more straight-forward, I think. But it's good to take a moment to savor the text by itself.

"Now the Heavens Start to Whisper" Text by Mary Louise Bringle In **All Creation Sings** #901

Now the heavens start to whisper, as the veil is growing thin. Earth from slumber wakes to listen to the stirring, faint within; See of promise, deeply planted, child to spring from Jesse's stem! Like the soil beneath the frostline, hearts grow soft to welcome him.



Heavy clouds that block the moonlight now begin to drift away. Diamond brilliance through the darkness shines the hope of coming day. Christ, the morning star of splendor, gleams within a world grown dim. Heaven's ember fans to fullness; hearts grow warm to welcome him.

Christ, eternal Sun of justice, Christ, the rose of wisdom's seed, Come to bless with fire and fragrance hours of yearning, hurt, and need. In the lonely, in the stranger, in the outcast, hid from view; Child who comes to grace the manger, tech our hearts of welcome you.

Council Hears Update about New Sign

In November, the Council heard with excitement that the permit for our new sign has

been approved, and there is a chance that the sign might be installed soon. It's possible the sign could be installed before Christmas, but Council is making sure that installation won't present a problem for our Christmas Eve worship service.

Council also discussed the Annual Congregational meeting which had been held after worship that morning. We heard positive things about the meal and our time together afterwards.

Reports were given by Pastor Gary, Pastor Amanda, and treasurer Todd Anderson. In the Pastor's Point devotional, Pastor Gary invited the Council members to reflect of the blessings our congregation received this year for which we can be thankful.

Steve Summer updated the Council on some activities of the Property Action Team and that he had heard about more needs after the congregational meeting.

Council also received the financial policies and procedures that are in place as they consider an outside financial review in the new year.

Family Promise has requested a special collection on a Sunday in January to help fund its program, and the Council set January 14 as the date for that collection.

Pastor Gary shared plans that have been developed for relandscaping the front of the church along with a bid to do it. Council has not yet acted on this proposal.

Offerings at our mid-week Advent worship services will be given to ELCA Good Gifts which provides farm animals, community development, education, and much more to third-world countries. Once the monies are collected, the staff will determine how to allocate it.
