Lent Begins February 14

Lent begins with the observance of Ash Wednesday on February 14. We will have Midday Quiet Communion at 12:15pm and it will include the imposition of ashes. Our evening worship will be at 7:00pm and will include Holy Communion and Imposition of Ashes.

Lent is an important season of the church year leading up to Easter as we repent of our sin and reflect on our need for a savior.

This Year's Lenten Theme: Queries

To "query" means "to ask or inquire about." There is a sense of the word that means to demand answers. That might now be how we often think of approaching Jesus — that we demand an answer — but if we reflect on it, it often is exactly how we approach Jesus. And how Jesus often approaches us. The Gospels are full of times when people came to Jesus asking him a question, and we can often hear our own questions echoed in theirs. There are also

times in the Gospel story when Jesus asks questions of people, and whenever he does, answers are demanded of them, and of us as well.

This year's Lenten Theme is Queries. Beginning on Ash Wednesday and all the way through Good Friday, we will explore questions that people asked Jesus, and



questions that Jesus asked people. In both, we will see ourselves and grow as we question ourselves along with those people in the Bible. Come along for this important Lenten journey.


We think we finally have an understanding of a new behavior that our dog, Chance, has been doing. You see, lately, Chance hasn't had anything to do with Nan. Now it's true that oftentimes, dogs will give themselves

more to one person than another. Angel, our other dog, is clearly Nan's dog, and Chance has always been closer to me, but lately, for Chance, it's me or nothing.

This is a dog who normally wolfs his food down as quickly as he can. If I feed them, he runs as hard as he can to get to his bowl. If Nan takes their food to them, Chance sometimes comes halfway across the yard, and then stops, or sometimes he doesn't even leave his house at all. Just a few days ago, Angel stood on our deck and barked at Chance, urging him to come up and eat his food. We've struggled to figure out why Chance is avoiding Nan.

Recently, we've come to an educated guess. We noticed that this behavior started after Nan's stroke, and so we suspect that Chance has noticed something 'different' about her that is unlike what she was before. Whatever it is, it's enough that Chance knows something isn't right, and so he's doing everything he can to avoid it.

It's made me think of Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is on February 14th this year, and we will gather on that Wednesday night for worship, and we will leave with the dark mark of ashes on our heads. As we begin the impo-



sition of ashes, part of the words are: "As disciples of Jesus, we are called to a discipline that contends against evil and resists whatever leads us away from love of God and neighbor. I invite you, therefore, to the discipline of Lent--self-examination and repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of love--strengthened by the gifts of word and sacrament."



And that's why I think about Chance. You see, Chance knows that something isn't right, and he's trying to avoid it. Well, Lent — and that sign of ashes on our heads — might be understood as the same thing. We are called to notice that something isn't right in how we are living and that we are called to

avoid it. As the Invitation to Lent says, we are called "to a discipline that contends against evil and resists whatever leads us away from love of God and neighbor." Our ways lead to death. God's way leads to life. That's what those ashes on our foreheads mean.

That's the other part of that Invitation to Lent that we will hear on Ash Wednesday. Not only are we invited to self-examination and repentance, prayer and fasting, we are also invited to sacrificial giving and works of love. We are invited into new behaviors of compassion and care for one another. We are invited to avoid our old ways, and to embrace the new way of life in God that is expressed through love for others. And not just others like us: All Others.

Maybe it's fortuitous that Ash Wednesday this year falls on Valentine's Day. As we celebrate this day of love, we are reminded through the ashes of God's love for us. We are reminded of our need for a savior, and of God's all encompassing love for us in sending our savior to us. There's a candy heart that says "Be Mine," and on this Ash Wednesday, that's what God is saying to us. "I love you. Be mine. Take the love I have for you, and share it with others. Live love for one another." That's the Valentines Ash Wednesday message.

Chance stopped halfway in the yard again yesterday,m but this time, Nan went out to him, and he rolled over for her to rub his belly. Love restores relationship. In love, we are restored to one another. In love, we are restored to God.

Chicks and Ducks and Geese Gonna Scurry to Make a Difference

Last November, the Council dedicated our Advent offerings to go to ELCA Good Gifts. These gifts provide lasting change in the lives of those deeply in need across our world. We do much to help in many ways locally; it feels good to reach out a little further and make a difference in this unique way.

This year our Advent offerings totaled a little over \$1500. The staff then met and chose to direct the money to purchase these items where they are needed:



- A fish farm A fish farm starts with a pond, training, and a few fast-growing fish such as tilapia. Soon the pond can provide the community with a longtime supply of fish, rich in vitamins, minerals and protein.
- Honeybees and a Community Vegetable Garden Honeybees provide honey to eat and beeswax to transform into handcrafted soaps and candles, allowing a family to start and small business. They also pollinate a community vegetable garden, starting with a shared plot of soil, drought-resistant seeds, and tools and training. The garden provides tomatoes, potatoes, cabbage, beans cassava and more to eat and to sell for income.
- A Latrine A startling 2 billion people lack access to basic sanitation. A new latrine, along with training to help with maintenance and hygiene leads to a much healthier community.
- A Microloan to a Woman to Start a Small Business A microloan can be just what a woman needs to start her business weaving, baking, or running a storefront, for example to create a steady source of income and help her family overcome poverty. As she repays the loan, the funds are reinvested to keep the cycle of giving growing and increase impact.
- Send 2 Girls to School Worldwide, girls are far less likely than boys to be enrolled in school. Helping families with school fees and uniforms can eliminate the difficult choice parents make about which child goes to school and which stays home. Educating a girl opens a world of opportunity for her future and the future of her family and community.
- Feed a Refugee Family for One Month Refugee camps shelter people who have fled war and violence and food supplies help them stay healthy after a long, dangerous journey to safety.
- A Family Farm A cow, a couple of goats, a dozen chicks, two pigs, farming tools, seeds, and agricultural training can create a world of opportunity for a family living in poverty. With eggs, milk, and meat to eat and sell, and tools and training to increase the harvest, this gift makes a big difference. In addition, we added a rooster to keep the eggs coming.
- The Good Gifts Catalog is most often put out in the weeks before Christmas as a giving opportunity, but in truth the catalog is available all year long for gifts or to honor someone. You can also find it at ELCA.org/goodgifts.



This month we have the season of Lent coming up very quickly. Lent has always been a season of discernment for me. Perhaps it is a God

Wink. Maybe it is a time of year that I pay more attention. Whatever it may be, I find that the journey through Lent provides us with the opportunity for self-reflection, discernment, and a search for the Kingdom of God in our midst.

As we enter into this time, let's make it an intentional season for growing in our relationship with God and one another. There are so many ways that we can do this. What calls to each person may be different. The part that matters is that each of us uses this time intentionally.

What sparks your imagination? Do you want to get to know others in our family of faith? That could look like reaching out to someone at Redeemer each week. Have coffee together. Talk. Share stories. Are you inclined to take up a daily reading? There are a host of various Lent devotionals available. Is serving your community more your

style? There are 40 days of Lent. What would it look like to take up the challenge of 40 acts of random kindness?

If you're interested in what this might look like for you and you need some guidance or ideas reach out to me, Pastor Gary, or Jim. We'd be happy to brainstorm Lenten practices that can enrich both your life and the life of the Redeemer Family.

Council Working to Maintain Property

Redeemer has been blessed with an amazing facility and Council has recently been taking steps to spruce it up and make sure it is main-

tained well. In January, the Council heard updates on the new landscaping that will be installed soon across the front of our building, learned that the new sign should be installed beginning January 29, and heard from the Property Action Team about repairs and improvements around the campus. One important issue that surfaced is that termites were found in the room that holds storage for Family Promise, and it is being treated under our termite contract.

Pastor Gary suggested that we can go ahead and pursue our last phase of the Dominion program that retrofits our lights to more efficient LED lights and Council approved. Pastor Gary also recommended that we look at our existing lawn care contract to make sure it is what we want and then engage Maddox Davis in discussions about it. Again, Council approved.

In other matters, The Council heard reports from both pastors and from Treasurer Todd Anderson. Thanks to generous giving from the congregation, e finished the year in a strong financial position.

Chair Bill Newmyer presented a list of dates for upcoming Council meetings, and then the discussion moved to the upcoming GSB Synod Training event to be held here at Redeemer on January 27. Councils from across the

synod will come for training on how to be effective and focused in what they do. Thanks to Martha Summer and others for helping with food and other logistics.

Todd Anderson distributed information about an outside Financial Review for the Coiuncil to review as we continue to consider the best option.

The Lenten Offering was dedicated to Lunch on the Lawn and we are developing items we can collect or buy with donations that the unhoused in Columbia need most.

The Council declined a request to sponsor Cupid's
Chase this year and ended
the meeting as they learned
of the Shrove Tuesday pancake supper on February
13.

The meeting closed with prayer and the peace.






