### New Sign to Be Installed

Redeemer's new electronic sign is scheduled to be installed early in January. First, our current sign will be demolished to make way for the new sign which will be placed a few feet closer to the center of our street-front. Then, the new sign will be erected. The whole process should take approximately 4 days. Then the staff will be trained on how to create and post messages about our ministries and invitations to the community on the sign. The updated sign will not only provide us flexibility in the messages we communicate, but also point to how we are moving into the future.



Special appreciation goes to Preston Smith who has been changing the message on our sign every week for at least 5 years. Now he can retire the broomstick he has been using to hold up the cover while he changes the sign. ☺

Goodbye.

At this time of year, that's the perfect thing to say. Goodbye to you all. Goodbye to this new year we have entered. Goodbye, goodbye.

I know, I know. As we begin this new year together, you might think it is time to say hello to each other and to this time stretching out before us. But I think we need to say goodbye.

You see—and this will probably come as no surprise to most of you — I enjoy words. And so it was that Christmas a year ago, my son Michael gave me a book with the imposing and intriguing title of *The Curious Compendium of Wonderful Words: A Miscellany of Obscure Terms, Bizarre Phrases, and Surprising Etymologies*. Well, that was right up my alley. Even better, it was full of short articles that I could read when I had the chance, and so for most of last year, I have gently waded through this book, sticking my toe in the waters of this curious phrase or that obscure meaning. It was wonderful.

As I got near the end of the book, I came to the page that offered *A Brief History of the Word Goodbye*. Here is what it said:

When you tell someone "Goodnight," you're basically saying "I hope you have a good night" or something to that effect. The same goes for most other [greeting](#) and parting expressions that begin

with *good*: *Good day, good morning, good evening, good afternoon*, etc. Following that trend, it seems like *goodbye* must be short for "I hope you have a good bye" and *bye* must be some obsolete term for a certain time of day.

But neither of those assumptions is true. In fact, *bye* started out as an abbreviation — and *good* wasn't originally *good* at all.



As far back as the 14th century, English speakers were saying "[God be with you](#)" when they parted ways. It took a little while for them to land on a suitable shortening of the phrase, but they got there by the mid-16th century. In 1575, per the [Oxford English Dictionary](#), *godbwye* appeared in print for the first time, in a letter from English scholar Gabriel Harvey.

"And then to requite your gallonde of godbwyes, I regive you a pottle of howedyes," he [wrote](#). In today's English, Harvey's poetic sentiment loosely translates to this one: "And then to reciprocate your gallon of goodbyes, I give you back a half-gallon of howdies." ([Howdy](#), by the way, has its roots in *how do you do?*)

But the evolution of *God be with you* to *godbwye* and then to *goodbye* wasn't linear—people seemingly spelled the expression however they wanted to. Examples include *God be wy you, God buoye, good bwi't'ye, good b' w' y*, and so on. [Shakespeare](#) alone wrote it at least three different ways in three different plays.

As for how *God* became *good*, it's generally [believed](#) that people were influenced by all those other *good* phrases: *Good day* and *goodnight* had already been around since the 13th century. While *God be with you* remains a relatively common utterance in religious circles, *goodbye*—which started cropping up in the early 1700s—eventually supplanted it as a secular farewell. In other languages' versions of *goodbye*, however, the religious connection is still crystal-clear. Both the French *adieu* and the Spanish *adios* literally translate to "to God."

And so, that's why as we begin a new year together, I say to you, "Goodbye." God be with you. God be with you in all that you undertake this year. God be with you to guide you in your choices. God be with you to watch over and care for you. God be with you together as we worship and serve, receive and live love, share and care for one another.

Welcome to 2024. Goodbye.





through Sharing God’s Love. Redeemer’s Coat Drive will continue through the end of January 2024. If you have any questions please contact Connie Davis or Preston Smith.





## Council Elects New Officers for 2024, Approves New Landscaping Plan

To help avoid Christmas conflicts, the Council met a week earlier than usual in December and moved their meeting to immediately following worship. The newly elected members of Council were invited to attend to get a 'running start' on next year's ongoing agenda items and to help elect next year's Council officers.

Reports were received from the Pastors and from the treasurer and approved. In the Pastor's Point, Pastor Gary asked Council members what advice and guidance they would give to those just coming on Council.

In unfinished business, the Council learned that the new sign should be installed in early January. The sign will offer electronic messaging capability to communicate about our ministries to our community.

Throughout the fall, a group of concerned members have been putting together a plan for relandscaping the front of the church building. Council approved up to \$6000 to cover plants, labor, and potential irrigation needs. These monies will come from the Council Discretionary Fund, and the congregation will be given an opportunity to contribute toward this as well.

The Council also designated part of Pastor Gary's and Pastor Amanda's salary as housing allowance as allowed

by the IRS code.

January 14 was chosen as the date for the Council Installation, and the Council scheduled their meetings for 2024 to be the third Sundays at 6:00pm.


