

Twelve to Be Confirmed May 19

Redeemer will celebrate the Affirmation of Baptism for twelve of our youth on Pentecost Sunday, May 19. We celebrate this important milestone of faith and life for Kåre Burke,

Tarike Burke, Gladdy Sung, Dylan Coffman, Wesley Cowan, Reily Googe, Jonah Griffin, Josi May, Brady Patel, Zoey Patel, Gretchen Sorrel, and Lilly Thomas.

Traditionally known as 'Confirmation,' it is now called Affirmation of Baptism because in this rite, these young men and women are affirming and assuming responsibility for the promises their parents made for them in baptism. They promise to live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?

Redeemer confirms on Pentecost Sunday, the birthday of the Church. On this day, we celebrate the birthday of Church, marked by the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the disciples. In

the same way, we pray for these young men and women that the Holy Spirit might fill their lives with faith and zeal for God.

Guest Preacher for Pentecost Sunday



On Pentecost Sunday, May 19, Rev. David Coffman will be our guest preacher for the day. Pastor Coffman is the Chaplain at Newberry Coillege, so part of his coming will help connect us with Newberry, but there's another reason he will be here. During the worship, David's son, Dylan, will Affirm his baptism with our other students. We welcome Pastor Coffman for this important day his life, and in the life of Redeemer.

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I was struck just before Easter with a line Pastor Amanda had in one of the prayers she wrote and led for worship. She prayed that we might have longer altars in our churches. It was a wonderful prayer, ex-

pressed beautifully. The altar is the table around which the family of God gathers. Longer altars can hold more people. In her prayer, she was praying that the altar might be a welcome place for more people, and especially for those who feel isolated and excluded away.

But her words also got me to thinking about how my preference is for large altars that dramatically emphasize that we are a church of Word and Sacrament. And then I began reminiscing about the altars in the churches I have served. I've stood behind many altars for worship, but I was most often behind the altars in those three churches I have served.

The first church I served, Grace, in Prosperity had a fairly large altar, and perhaps laid the foundation for my

preference for large altars. That altar was probably about ten feet long, and around that altar, the church family gathered in a strong community of love and worship.



The church I served in Myrtle Beach, however, was about as small an altar as I've ever seen. It needed to be small, however, because the sanctuary was fairly small and we had lots and lots of people crowded in for worship. That altar was probably something li ke five feet long, and standing behind it I was sandwiched in between the altar and the pulpit behind me.

One of my favorite stories about this altar was that there was storage space underneath that altar, and one All Saints Sunday, I decided to store the missal book and stand under there to free up space on the altar. You see, in that congregation, they placed a rose on the altar for every member who had died in the previous year and with such a small altar and six or seven roses,



plus communion on the altar as well, we really needed more room. I knew I could lead the worship from the hymnbook in my hands: I didn't need the missal book, so I stored it underneath. I should also mention the Bishop was there for the service too.

Everything went fine until I came to the Preface. That's the part the pas-

tor sings during communion. That part isn't in the hymnal; it's in the missal book. Suddenly I was there, the book was under the altar, and the only choice I had was to make up a Preface on the spot. Maybe that's why I like big altars.

One way I sometimes think about altars is that they are for sacrifices. With the body and blood of Jesus in communion on the altar, I sometimes find myself thinking of Jesus on the altar, the sacrifice for our sins. Indeed, some of the cloths, for example, the Fair Llinen, points exactly to that. The Fair Linen is the large cloth that stretches across the altar from end to end, sits directly on the altar surface, and is meant to represent the burial shroud of Jesus. It's not hard to think about Jesus on that altar, bloodied, dying, for us.

That altar at Redeemer is the largest altar of the three churches I have served. It is 12 feet long, which could easily accommodate Jesus dying for us. It's a powerful, dramatic altar.

As we gather for worship on Good Friday each year, the altar is stark and bare. The church gets darker and darker as we make our way slowly through Jesus dying for us. This year, when the sanctuary was completely dark and we were singing Were You There?, I happened to look up from where I was kneeling to see the altar. From where I was, the red light from the exit light (that we can't turn off) was reflecting over almost the whole surface of the wood of the altar. Caught up in Jesus' suffering and death, it looked like the altar was covered in blood. His blood: given, shed, for us.

I like large altars. They speak so eloquently of God's amazing, powerful, overwhelming, abundant grace and love.



In July Redeemer will send 17 youth and 4 adults to the ELCA Youth Gathering in New Orleans. This event will bring

thousands of youth from all over the country and the world together for faith formation, service, learning, and fun. Our youth have the opportunity to hear speakers that will challenge them, music that will inspire them, and experiences that will bring them closer to God. We'd like to invite you to be a part of making this happen for the Redeemer Family's young people. During May and June we will start the sale of stock in the youth group. I'm writing this article exactly one week since my hand surgery took place. But you'll be reading it almost a month past surgery, so it's impossible to know with any confidence what healing and recovery has happened by the time we get to the first of May.

However, I can, with confidence report on some things:

The initial results of surgery were very good. Three contractures were all successfully removed.

It took a total of eighteen sutures to close the incisions.

Physical therapy is no fun.

Physical therapy is the only way to fully recuperate.

Recovery takes time.

Recovery takes patience. I have learned that the first thing I do every morning is to put on patience—as someone told me "put on your patience-pants!" Oh, how true!

And speaking of that, it's easier to button your pants if you zip up first.

Not all pain is bad.

My hand feels so much better when it's securely stabilized in my splint—sometimes being still is in itself healing. Lois McLeod is a true treasure.

Okay, let's go into that a bit more. I deeply appreciate Lois stepping in and playing while I had surgery and for the weeks of rehab. She plays beautifully and has a beautiful spirit.

I am never concerned about the music or if she'll come in right or if she'll play the right thing.

And that leads to-

I am truly enjoying the privilege of worshiping fully and deeply.

Breaking Down Big Churchy Words

When I went to seminary I felt like one of my primary textbooks should be a dictionary. There were so many long words that often had a much simpler meaning. But yet, we still use those big fancy words. And here's a little secret... often I *still* have to look up many of these long words to make sure I know exactly what they mean. So, I figured we could look at these words together in a monthly newsletter article.



Let's look at Incarnation.

Incarnation - Literally this means the embodiment in flesh or something taking on flesh. Within Christianity this is used to describe the embodiment of God in Jesus. God takes on flesh. God embodies humanity.

Most modern denominations of Christianity believe that God became incarnate in Jesus. Jesus is fully God. Jesus is fully human. This belief is one of the central teachings of the Lutheran Church and also among other denominations. There are a few sects of Christianity that have different beliefs about who Jesus is and how he relates to God the Creator and God the Holy Spirit.

Incarnation is an especially important concept when we talk about the resurrection. God took on flesh in the person of Jesus. Jesus died. Jesus was raised from the dead and experienced a

bodily resurrection, not his spirit, not a ghost. Jesus in human flesh was alive again after spending three days dead in the tomb.

Council Continues to Consider 'Core Values'

Since February, Redeemer's Church Council has been participating with about ten other congregations in a SC Synod led Council Training course. Part that that course has been focused on developing congregational vision and mission statements. To that end, Redeemer's Council has been doing some initial work to consider the core values of our ministry together. Eventually, this discussion will expand to the congregation as we work and grow together in serving God and our community.

Over the past few months, the Council has also been working on developing a policy to provide paid time off for our lay staff. In the April meeting, the policy was approved and is based on hours worked and years served.

Pastor Amanda is continuing to explore the costs associated with migrating our church management software to a cloud based system.

Council spent time discussing the financial reports that the council receives. This was brought about when it was discovered that there was money being set aside for the youth to use to attend the ELCA National Youth Gathering. The money was there, but doesn't appear on the reports Council receives. So, there was significant discussion about what is reported and how we can be more transparent in these reports. The Finance Committee will be looking at improvements.


