

### Church Council Takes Initial Steps for Musician Search

The news of Jim Boatwright's retirement at the end of the year took everyone by surprise, and it's pretty clear that whomever comes next to Redeemer will have big shoes to fill. Jim may be followed, but he cannot be replaced. The

reality is, however, that we need to take some steps now as we anticipate his retirement.

First, we need to celebrate Jim and his ministry among us. Council has begun the discussion of how that might happen, so be sure to watch for more information about that.

Council has also begun putting a Search Committee in place. The first task the Search Committee will have is to consider the needs of Redeemer and the gifts we are looking for in a new musician. That may involve discussions with groups or individuals from the choir, handbell choir, etc. With that information, they will begin work on a Job Description, and finally after that, it will be time to begin our search.

Meanwhile, Council will begin working on questions like: Is the position full time or part time? Do we search for one person to fill the Music Director role and one to accompany, or do we search for two people? Can we afford two people? How much can we offer in terms of salary? Of course, some of this, like whether

it's one person or two may depend on the candidates who apply.

So, as you can surmise, all of this will take some time to get in place before the actual search begins. The new person might well not be in place by the time Jim leaves, and there may be some months of substitutes until the new person is found.

When Bill Newmyer announced Jim's resignation to the Congregation on a Sunday, Artie asked if Lois could take the job. Lois has been consulted, and prefers to keep her role as it is now, and suject to the new person desiring to have her in her role.

Please be patient and continue to pray for Redeemer in its search for a musician.

Most Sunday mornings, I try to listen to the choir's anthem during worship. I have to admit, I can't always do it. Frankly, there are some Sundays when something has happened in worship or something is about to

happen that I need to be thinking about, and it takes away my ability to focus on the anthem. Frankly, there's a lot going on up front, even in what may appear to be the quiet times.

However, on a recent Sunday, there was no midworship crisis, things were progressing smoothly, and I thought I was going to be able to focus on the anthem. All of a sudden, as I sat there, I noticed Pastor Amanda dressing the altar for Holy Communion.

You might not be familiar with that term: dressing the altar, but that's what it is called as we 'set the table' for the meal to come. In fact, you may not have been aware of it, but there are two styles of altars that churches have. Some churches have a chest altar that rests against the front wall. These altars are reminiscent of the Ark of the Covenant from the Old Testament. More modern churches have altars that resemble a table to emphasize the Last Supper and the meal


of Holy Communion, and these altars are pulled away from the wall so that God's family may gather



around them. Redeemer's altar is an interesting mix of these two styles. We have a table in box form that proclaims God both ways. We gather around God's table, and also remember God's covenant promises to us.

I watched Pastor Amanda dressing the altar for communion, making things ready, and I noticed that she was doing it a bit differently than I do when it is my turn to dress the altar. We don't do things in the same order or in the same way. Let me be clear: both ways are right and neither way is wrong. Our ways are

often entertain this way, but my family did. As I grew up, my mother taught me some guidelines for how to set the table for guests. For example, the main entrée is placed near where the guests will be seated instead of near where the host is seated. This shows honor to your guests. She taught me to place foods after that by putting foods of different colors next to each other and spreading out things of similar colors so that the table is attractive and interesting. Of course, you need to do things like put the chips before the dip or make sure the toothpicks are handy for meatballs. In other words, you think of it from your guests' perspective.

There's more going on during the dressing of the altar than you might have imagined. We aren't just getting the table ready, and I have mentioned a few times that perhaps my favorite moment in worship happens as we dress the altar. I think it is a powerful moment when we unveil the bread and wine at the center of the table. When that happens the body and blood of Jesus is being revealed right there among us. It is a powerful, dramatic moment in worship. We encourage those running the cameras for our worship to keep the focus on the altar until this is done, and then to switch to the choir singing the anthem. In that moment, it is made clear that Jesus is among us in his sacrificial love.

As we gather around the table like a family, you may never have realized that the altar rail becomes an extension of the altar itself. As you kneel at the rail, you are kneeling at the altar. You are truly gathered with God's family around God's table.

Sorry, choir, but I missed most of the anthem that day. I hope none of us miss that the table is made ready. Come, gather with God's family for the meal of love and grace.

Habitat for Humanity has a short list...


- 1. Demonstrate the love of Jesus Christ.
- 2. Focus on shelter.
- 3. Advocate for affordable housing.
- 4. Prompt dignity and hope.
- 5. Support sustainable and transformative development.

The idea is that everything that Habitat for Humanity does is connected with at least one of these core values.

The company, Nike, has its own set of core values.

- 1. Community.

Ideally, all of Nike's development, production, marketing, and sales relate to at least one of these fundamental ideas.



Churches, families of faith, are similar. The community that makes up the congregation operates on a set of core values. Some may be obvious and others more subtle. However, it is important to consider, name, and promote what is at the core of our ministry and identity.

Our church council has started to consider what some of Redeemer's core values may be. They are also working to bring this conversation out into the congregation. Don't be surprised if someone asks what words describe Redeemer before you begin choir practice. There will hopefully be a little time taken during our Bible Studies. We'll have a couple of special conversations available before and after worship during September.

All of this is an effort to further discern who we are as a family of faith and what God is calling us to do. None of these conversations create dramatic change in our ministry. They do, however, give us a platform to further explore our role in the world around us and to be intentional about using our gifts, talents, and resources for God's work in the world.

# Council Continues Work to Determine 'Core Values'

With a lighter agenda in August, the Council took more time than usual to work on a project they began in the spring to help determine Redeemer's Core Values. Last Spring, the Redeemer Council hosted Councils from across the synod in a multi-session workshop focused on helping congregations be more focused on the mission of their congrgations. The first step in that is to determine the Core Values of the congregation.

Soon, this process will be pushed out to the congregation. You may be asked things like, "What words come to your mind when you think of Redeemer?" "What do you like best about Redeemer?" "What words do you think characterize Redeemer?"

The Core Values will be gathered, thought about, brought together, and formed into a statement that reflects who Redeemer is and what we are about. Even later, these iden-

tified values may help craft a mission statement for our congregation in the present and the future.

In the August meeting, reports were given by both pastors, the treasurer, and Kare Burke represented the Youth and gave a report on their activities and things coming up in the near future.

The other major topic of discussion was the process to use in a search for a new musician after Jim retires at the end of the year. Pastor Gary shared information about how the search process had gone in the past, and suggested that that pattern might be a starting place for us now. A search committee will be formed which will begin by asking individuals and groups like the choir to share thoughts about what we might look for in a new musician. Then, the search committee would begin working on a job description.

Meanwhile, Council will be answering questions like how much we can afford to pay, how many hours, one person or two, and full time or part time? Flexibility and adaptability will be important since we don't know what candidates we might have nor the gifts they will have to meet our needs.

Council is also beginning to discuss plans to celebrate Jim's decade of service to our congregation, so watch for more information.

The meeting closed with prayer by Pastor Amanda and the sharing of the Peace.




