Every year it seems like we wrap up the Christmas season, catch our breath, and then we dive head first into the sea-

son of Lent. With Easter being a little later than usual we have a little more space. However, our Lenten journey begins very soon. On March 4, Redeemer will host a Community Pancake Supper for Shrove Tuesday. Dinner will be served at 6:00 pm and the 525 players will provide entertainment. Ash Wednesday begins early, 7:30-8:30 am, with the opportunity for drive-through imposition of ashes and Holy Communion. At 12:15 pm there is Quiet Communion and imposition of ashes in the Sanctuary. Our evening Ash Wednesday starts at 7:00 pm in the sanctuary and will include Holy Communion.

And it's just that quickly that Lent begins. One of the pieces of this church season that I find so valuable is the opportunity for worship and reflection on Wednesday nights. Each Wednesday during Lent at 7 pm we'll gather in the sanctuary and ponder faith practices. This year our series is Practicing but not Perfect. There are so many ways that we engage with our faith. But at times, we find ourselves relying on just a few opportunities. During Lent this year, we're challenging ourselves to stretch out and explore the

various ways we practice and grow in our faith.

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In February, Nan and I went to Texas to see our son and his wife, and especially to see Hannah, our eighteen month old granddaughter. It was stormy on the day we flew out, making travel difficult with just about

every plane delayed, and just about every plane full. As we taxied to take off one time, we talked about what a taxing day it had been. As we were on the plane while others boarded before the longest part of our flight, Nan got out her book to read. That's a miracle itself: Since her stroke, reading has been difficult for her, but now she can. So, I was interested in what she was reading and asked about it.



She was completing a book Michael had loaned her, so she was finishing the book with the plan to return it to him while we were there. I looked at it. The title was A Dog's Purpose by W. Bruce Cameron. I like dogs, so I read the back cover. It described a fanciful tale about a

dog who is looking for his purpose in life, and when, for one reason or another, the dog dies, he is somehow reincarnated to live another life and continue his search for his purpose. The back cover went on to say that it was a humorous tale about pets and people and finding love. However, when I asked Nan what it was about, she said simply, It's about a puppy who gets rescued over, and over, and over.

You know, what she said is a pretty good description of Lent. During Lent, we think about our sin, our need for God to save us, and the lengths Jesus goes to in order to do that. In puppy terms, we need rescuing over, and over, and over.



And that IS our story. Not only do we fail to obey God or apply God to every aspect of life, not only do we sin—as one of our liturgies says — " ...by our own fault, by our own grievous fault," but we do it repeatedly, over, and over again.

Lent calls us to remember: to remember our need for Jesus to come; to forsake our pride, complacency, self-satisfaction, and hubris that imply we don't need Jesus; to remember that it was our sin — our very own sin —that put Jesus on that cross; to forsake striving for our way and instead seek God's way. We can't do it alone. We need rescuing, over, and over, and over again.

Maybe it's time for a new book, not about a dog, but

about us.

abounding in steadfast love.

Mike Parker, who has taken that role now, and to


Jean Taylor who is taking on leadership of our Altar Guild.

Sunday Book Study Schedule



When I went to seminary I felt like one of my primary textbooks should be a dictionary. There were so many long words that often had a much simpler meaning. There are also many concepts that I had to wrap my mind around as well. So, I figured we could look at these words and ideas together in a monthly newsletter article.

Let's look at Messiah

The word "Messiah" comes from the Hebrew word *mashiach* (
,(חֻשִׁיחַ), which literally means "anointed one." In ancient Israel, a
person who was anointed with oil—such as a king or priest—was
set apart for a special purpose. In the context of Scripture, the
Messiah is the promised deliverer who would bring salvation to

God's people.

In the Old Testament, there are prophecies about the coming Messiah, who would restore Israel and bring

peace and justice to the world. This word is important because, for some, it directly points to Jesus Christ in the New Testament. Christians believe He is the fulfillment of these messianic prophecies.

Isaiah 9:6, tells us, "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." This verse, among many others, speaks to the anticipation of a Messiah who would bring about God's reign in a new way.

When we use the word *Messiah* today, we think of Jesus Christ. It's worth asking:

- What does it mean for Jesus to be the anointed one?
- How does recognizing Jesus as the Messiah shape our understanding of His mission in the world?


Let's continue to explore these big churchy words and ideas!
